Wow! I blinked and the 2014-2015 school year was over. For the teachers and upper classmen who have been here for years, it was tough getting used to a new



principal. There were new rules and expectations, but as the year went on feedback from students, parents, staff, and faculty was very positive. Not only did students thank me, but they even reported to the Arizona Department of Education that this year was a much

better learning environment for them. When that comes from students, it's very heart-warming and it's exactly what you want to hear.

Just being a first year principal is tough but the district also rolled out the new reading, writing, and math curriculum aligned with the new Arizona College and Career Ready standards which was stressful. Teachers worked in Professional Learning Communities to develop unit and lesson plans using these new standards. Walking into classrooms, I could really see the students engaged in their learning at a much higher level of critical thinking.

Testing seemed to be overwhelming this year. We had quarterly benchmarks in reading, writing and math. We won't get the test results until October. There was a year's moratorium on letter grades because of the new assessment measure.

I was so happy we were able to fulfill the Catalina Foundation's dream of having their own conference room on campus. Meetings are already being held there. We love having them on campus. The support they provide us is immeasurable.

Graduation was a magical night. Seeing those incredible seniors walk across the stage to accept their diplomas was such an incredible moment, and the pride I felt as their principal can't be described.

As I look forward to next year, it is with a real sense of excitement. The teachers we've hired are young, eager, and excited to become a part of the Catalina community. As I reflect back on last year and look ahead to next year, I can honestly tell you that I would not want to be anyone but the principal of Catalina High School.

Blast from the Past

For CHS students from 1980-1985, **Dr. Lamond Preston** is a name they know, but others may not be familiar with the name. He was Catalina's fourth principal and the first black principal in TUSD. He was a native Tucsonan and he lived in the barrios where he and his siblings learned to speak Spanish. He graduated from Tucson High and attended The University of Arizona where he earned four degrees, the last a doctorate in education.

He taught biology classes at THS and later became a counselor, dean of boys, and principal of summer school. In 1980 he was appointed Catalina's principal.

Preston was a role model and well-liked by all his Catalina students and colleagues. "He took the time to understand people no matter who they were, and he could relate to anyone," his wife said of him.

Preston's philosophy was "service is the price you pay for the space you occupy." As a result of his philosophy, he served on many boards and volunteered for local civic and community organizations after his retirement.

FOUNDATION FORUM - 2015

Following up on our first Foundation Forum held in 2011, a committee was formed to organize another one this past spring. **Emily Morrison '60** served as coordinator with **Jenny Bond '66, Jo Riester '66, and Sandy Elers '58** serving on the committee. The successful event brought together delegates from both district foundations and those of individual schools like our own CHSF. The session was held at the Metropolitan Education Commission (MEC) office to work through an agenda of topics identified as key to the successful operation of school-focused foundations.

Each delegate brought ideas and concerns that were



explored and shared. The session was determined by the needs expressed by those in attendance.

Midway through the forum, delegates

enjoyed a Baggin's lunch to renew their energy. During the lunch break, **June Vignery** gave an overview of the mission of the MEC, and Jo Riester shared information about Thrivent for Lutheran grants.

Tricia Pena of the Vail District Foundation recorded the session and followed up by sharing the notes with all the attendees. The Forum was considered by all to have been a great success, and a request was made that a similar forum be held every six months.

GRANTS FOR 2015 ASSIST MANY STUDENTS IN HEALTH, TECHNOLOGY, AND BOOKS By Jennifer Sue Bond '66, Grants Chairman

This past year the Foundation awarded a number of mini-grants to teachers to help academic achievement, sports performance, and improve the vision and community participation of Catalina's students.

Jennifer Johnson (\$570) received a mini-grant to provide her Exceptional Education students with autism an iPad Mini with retinal display and some interactive educational software. A student teacher from the U of A introduced the students to using one the previous year, and it is a very successful way of engaging the students in math and other lessons. When CHSF board members delivered the iPad Mini, it was very obvious how excited and engaged the students were to receive this computer.

Lisa Sullivan (\$500), a new English teacher at Catalina, was awarded a grant to enhance the learning environment in her classroom by purchasing a variety of supplies including white boards and two book sets: 1) a set of graphic novels that transform the works of William Shakespeare into accessible content for



struggling readers and 2) a set of books from the Teens Top Ten List which boasts titles that reflect the current pulse of young adult literature which are targeted towards more accomplished readers. Additionally, she selected

a set of classroom posters that offer words of wisdom and encouragement from literature's brightest minds.

Jack Draper (\$200) received a grant to pay for the entrance fee for ten of his construction trade students to participate in the *Ride for Home* program of Habitat for Humanity and El Tour de Tucson. They earned medallions and El Tour t-shirts and also learned about Habitat for Humanity's building program. Many of these students are homeless themselves or live in group homes but expressed an interest in volunteering to help build houses for others.

Cindy Woods (\$500), Catalina's school nurse, was provided a grant to assist needy Catalina students to get

a professional eye exam and glasses. Nurse Woods is identifying students who need glasses and will work with the Lions Club and some other providers to get the students a professional exam and a set of



glasses. This should assist many of the homeless and low income students who have vision issues to be able to see better and should improve their school work.

Cheryl Beran (**\$500**) received a grant to take her Western Civilization class to see the U of A Repertory Theater's production of Shakespeare's "Othello." Unfortunately, she had to return the grant as the play was only presented on a non-school day.

Kate Gallion (**\$500**), school librarian, requested a grant to purchase more books. This is the third year in a row in which no funds were provided for library book purchases by the school district.

Jeremy Clarke (\$200) and donations of a video camera and a professional tripod were given for use in instructional development. Clarke will videotape lessons of a volunteer set of teachers who are interested in sharing their lessons in order to improve them.

Trinidad Tester (\$500) to purchase gardening equipment, seeds, etc. to use in the greenhouse at CHS to promote science, math, and health. Foundation board members also put Ms. Tester in touch with the folks at Community Gardens.

Catch your audience with your first words and end with impact! Trojan Hall of Fame inductee **Ford Burkhart '59** captivated and entertained a full house at the CHSF Spring Social last March.

From his early days at Catalina to giving a NYC fireman a ride on 9/11 and watching from the water's edge as the Twin Towers fell, Ford took us along with his exciting tales.

A Peace Corps volunteer, a world traveler, a UA journalism professor, a *New York Times* editor, doors opened at every turn for Ford, and he knew which key to use. He filled his life with interesting people, interesting assignments, and interesting travels.

Even today at 73, Ford continues to spin stories and edit pages for the *Arizona Alumnus* and *Edible Baja* magazines. Participants lingered long past the assigned time for concluding the event hanging on his every word. His advise to students was, "Read anything by Steinbeck, notice the best paragraphs are carefully crafted to begin and end with words that have impact."

And best of all, with all contributions going to CHSF scholarships, the donation basket was filled to well beyond any other Spring Social collection ever. Donations were suggested and donations were received gratefully.

THE LODGE ON THE DESERT MEETS CHS

You ask: How does a well-known resort and restaurant have a relationship with Catalina? Well...

Early this year the CHS culinary arts teacher **Stacie Rios** played a vital part in an event with TUSD food services and her students. The event showcased recipes from around the world: Iraq, Nepal, Pakistan, Ukraine, Mexico, Honduras, Somalia, and Puerto Rico.

TUSD Food Services recreated the recipes using healthy alternatives. For example: The Nepali recipe for Shrimp Momo is served as a traditional dumpling, instead it was served as a lettuce wrap. Delicious.

The English Language Development coordinator **Meg Riley** collected most of the recipes and organized the entertainment. Two dance groups performed comprised of Catalina Somali and Nepali students.

The culinary event was attended by TUSD Superintendant **Dr. Sanchez, Dr. Vega, and Dr. Morado** along with representatives from the Arizona Department of Education, The University of Arizona, and many well-known community members. All were impressed with the students, the dancing, and the food.

The event was a tremendous success according to Principal **Kathi Shaw**, and the winning dish was served in high schools across the district and also at The Lodge on the Desert.

KUDOS TO STUDENTS AND TEACHERS

Five band students were selected to participate in the Eastern Arizona College Honor Band in Thatcher, AZ.

Catalina senior **Colin Judstra '15** was chosen as moderator for Metropolitan Education Commission's Teen Town Hall held at Catalina with 130 attendees.

Math teacher **Charles Collingwood** and two of his students attended "The Magic of the Quadratic Equation Comes to Life" conference at Tucson High School.

Drama teacher **Christopher Moseley's** class performed the play, "Fortress," in a competition at The University of Arizona. The students received one Superior and two Excellent ratings. Well done!

The Catalina Pep band under the direction of Band Director **Robert Troglia** has been playing at basketball games to promote school spirit. The Pride of Catalina was invited to march in the Tucson Rodeo Parade and one parade judge commented "[I] was very proud of them. They were small, but mighty, and they showed up!" There were 25 students in the band, but this year over 40 have already signed up to play in the band.

The Trojan band has grown from thirteen students to twenty-five students from the spring of 2014 to now. This incredible growth will continue into the fall of 2015 with preliminary numbers showing over forty students wanting to join the Trojan band.

With the growing interest in the band program, there are a multitude of opportunities within our students' grasp. The Catalina Trojan Jazz Band has been established and is rapidly improving with its improvisation, as well as the ability to play different styles of music such as swing, Latin, and rock. We have also been constructing smaller ensembles for the students in which to perform. With this in mind, our early spring concert showcased many of these smaller ensembles which did an amazing job demonstrating their talents. With these expansions to our ensemble lists, the students here at Catalina are having more opportunities given to them than they have had in the past which is excellent!

The Catalina Trojan band and I are extremely grateful for the thought and the dedication of the Catalina High School Foundation and a dedicated alumnus who prompted the "Last Chair Tuba" Band Challenge. With this grant of \$10,000, we are going to be able to purchase many items that have been in need



of upgrade. We have already purchased with this money a director's repair kit which allows for easy "quick repairs" to avoid students losing their instruments for repair reasons. With growth of our band in numbers and in technique, the future looks bright for the Trojan band and with the help of the Catalina Foundation and the hard work of the students, we are charging forth into another year of success.

ALUMNUS CREATES EVA ROYCE FUND By Emily Kittle Morrison '60

We must be Doing Something Right. Every now and again we open the Foundation mail and find that someone sincerely believes in what we're doing and wants to continue the legacy. Such was the case last spring when, out of the blue, a letter arrived with a generous check (\$6000). While the donor wants to remain anonymous (and we promised to honor this), the directions were clear: "Please establish a fund in the name of **Ms. Eva Royce**." (Ms. Royce was the French and German teacher and faculty advisor of NHS at Catalina from 1956 until her retirement.)

It seems this graduate felt his French teacher made a very big impact on him and what he did with his life. As many alumni have, he kept in touch with her long after graduation. She was even there for him years later at a tough time for him. Ms. Royce reminded him that what had colored his life to that point was simply water under the bridge. What mattered was what he would choose to do as he stepped into the life ahead.

He first suggested we establish a scholarship for a deserving French student, but with the changing demographics and programs offered at Catalina (with 44 languages spoken by current students), he agreed that we might set broader parameters and recognize "a student for considerable success in a foreign language." This opened the door for many more possibilities and would even allow us the opportunity to honor a deserving refugee who has managed to master English and who plans to continue his or her education.

While the donation alone will assure the funding of several scholarships, the donor hopes, along with that of the CHS Foundation Board, that others who have been similarly touched by one or more teachers while they studied at CHS will want to step up and contribute to this new Eva Royce Memorial Fund, or create a fund for their favorite teacher.
