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CHS FOUNDATION CELEBRATES TENTH ANNIVERSARY

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE By Sandy Tanner Elers '58, CHSF President

The year 2017 is momentous for Catalina and the CHS Foundation. January 2017 marks the 60th anniversary of the opening of Catalina and the 10th anniversary of the formal incorporation of the

Catalina is a very different place from when it opened in 1957. The students' parking lot abounded with late model cars, and the 2000+ kids were from homes with two parents, food on the table, and clothes in the closet. Activities, clubs and sports were plentiful and affordable. Today, CHS has just over 700 students, 100 are homeless, 97% are on free or reduced price lunch, and we have the highest rate of student mobility in the district. Our student body is not just from the neighborhood, but students often commute long distances to attend. Sports events are not well attended (the \$4 fee is not affordable for most of the students) and activities take place at lunchtime because students have to catch buses to go home after school.

The good news is that National Honor Society is still going strong, the baseball team is expected to do well this spring, and the construction trades and Feast programs are popular and turn out well-educated students ready for the job market. Our music and drama programs are expanding in numbers. Arabic has been added to the curriculum. The Foundation awarded over \$7000 in grants to teachers this past year.

We recently lost our principal, **Kathryn Shaw**, due to medical necessity. **Antasio Holley**, formerly a vice-principal, is our new leader. We wish him well.

Our Spring Social is a Bar-B-Que at the Historic Rock Corral Ranch in Tumacacori. This fund raiser will feature a beautiful home full of southeastern Arizona history, a magnificent setting, good food, good people, and the occasional horse. (See page 3.)

RESEARCHER CHOSEN 2016 ALUM OF YEAR By Margie Wagner Fangmeier '58

Alum of the Year **David J. Getty, Ph.D. '61**. is a prominent researcher in medical imaging and has had a long, distinguished career. Getty taught at Brown University and was a senior research associate in the



Department of Radiology at Harvard Medical School and Brigham and Women's Hospital.

Getty worked for BNN Technologies of Cambridge, Mass., where he designed the Stereoscopic Digital Mammography (SDM) system. As principal investigator,

he conducted the preliminary study of stereo digital mammography. In the study, stereo digital mammography reduced false positives by 49 percent. There were 1500 participants in the study.

Digital mammography uses less radiation than traditional film mammography, reducing a lifetime of exposure to x-rays. Digital mammograms are faster than film mammograms because there is no film to develop. The image can be sent immediately to the radiologist for viewing.

Stereo Digital Mammography combines two digital breast x-rays taken from different angles, and produces a detailed three-dimensional image.

Due in large part to Getty's work, women across this nation can be assured that their mammography results can be depended upon as accurate, and it will not necessitate further painful invasive biopsies to determine if they have breast cancer.

Getty graduated from Stanford and earned his B.A. in psychology. To further his education, he attended the University of Pennsylvania where he received his master's degree and his doctorate in 1969.

Starting with his time in the Tucson Boy's Chorus, Dr. Getty has loved music. He has continued his interest throughout his life and currently sings in a mixed quartet and has sung the National Anthem at both the Red Sox and Celtics games in Boston.

BUSINESS LEADERSHIP LAUNCHED AT CHS By Theoni Taylor, Business and Yearbook Teacher

The business program is alive and well at Catalina! The Business Management and Administrative Services program has 20 students enrolled. The class includes lessons in business management, workplace employability skills, membership in Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA), and a position on the yearbook staff.

Business management lessons focus on obtaining and using financial information, marketing, technology in the work environment, and general management practices.

Our Career and Technical Student Organization is FBLA. The FBLA Mission is "to bring business and

education together in a positive working relationship through innovative leadership and career development programs."



In September, we invited the state members for a

presentation. We also had an Officer Training workshop. In October, we held our first fundraiser selling "Spooky Grams." We sold over 300 grams.

In November, we attended the FLEX conference in Phoenix with 4000 students from across Arizona. The conference offered three breakout workshops.

For our volunteer work, we joined with Beads of Courage to support and strengthen children and families coping with serious illness. Through the program children tell their stories using colorful beads as meaningful symbols of courage that commemorate milestones they have achieved along their unique treatment path. We volunteer once a month packaging beads.

The final activity of the semester was working on our Business Achievement Awards.

During the spring semester, we will participate with Junior Achievement in the *JA You're Hired* classroom program designed to promote career readiness in young people. The sessions will help students develop their abilities to communicate, solve problems, and lead. The lessons for workplace employability skills include communication, collaboration, professionalism, cross cultural competence, organizational culture, legal and ethical practices, and financial practices.

For the yearbook, students have worked on design, editing, photography, marketing, and sales. We're excited about our program and will continue to grow in our members and activities.

Some grants for fall 2016 were successful in the past and we deemed worthy to be supported again such as:

Alison Chlimes (\$250) Americorps VISTA coordinator, she will continue a lunch time speaker program which will bring in professionals to speak to students about possible career opportunities for their future.

Chaudette Gullen (\$500) Garden to Table - for exceptional students planting and learning to grow their own food and using math to determine germination days of plants. The Community Food Bank is partnering with this program.

Wanda Buchanan (\$400) Red Ribbon Week Education – this activity supports a week of fun activities to increase awareness of the effects of drug and alcohol use on individuals, family, friends, and the community.

Jack Draper (\$500) – to fund CHS students' ride in the Habitat for Humanity's El Tour de Tucson stationary bike event and to meet Habitat construction builders and volunteers to further their goals in construction.

Other grants new to our support included:

Darryl Carlson (\$500) support for cross country team -



8 pairs of shoes and 2 Garmin watches so runners can pace themselves, and participate at state and other meets.

Theoni Taylor (\$450) - initiated a Future Business Leaders of America Club. The officers have been elected and 18 students attended a Leadership

Extravaganza at Talking Stick resort in Scottsdale.

Chris Moseley (\$500) Theater Arts Workshop – purchase of tools to create stock scenery and sets for Catalina Trojan Players productions. Eighty students will learn how to build sets for theatrical productions.

Lori Encinas (\$150) T-shirts to identify the student team working on theater sets.

Jennifer Johnson (\$400) – funds were used to purchase music, tuners, and instructional support for exceptional education students to play a musical instrument. These students with disabilities are using smaller instruments (ukuleles) more suited to their capabilities.

INTRODUCING THE 2016 THOF INDUCTEES

Diana Page Champion (1958) is an expert in the prevention of child abuse and neglect. Her award-

winning prevention programs are recognized as national models and used by the U.S. Marine Corps. She was Coordinator for the Battered Child Team at University of Colorado Medical Center and spearheaded efforts to create a team approach to include hospital staff, community, and legal



representatives. One of her awards for excellence came from the White House (1991) as the Nation's 490th Point of Light.

David Giles, Ph.D. (1959) is the founder of Intermountain Center for Human Development and has



revolutionized the treatment of atrisk and mentally challenged populations. He places his clients in a home environment to help them develop their potential. He is expanding the scope of services to academic programs for children with specialized educational needs and

for youth diagnosed with autism. His Academy promotes educational excellence for students with autism.

Gerry LaBelle (1960) began his journalism career as editor of the *Trojan Trumpeteer*. He joined the

Associated Press in 1968 where he was a broadcast writer in New York. In the 80s, he covered the bombings in Lebanon, the Iran-Iraq war, and the Seoul Olympics. His 20-year overseas career was at press bureaus in New Delhi,



Jerusalem, and Cairo where he was AP's chief Middle East correspondent. He covered stories on the massacre of Palestinians in a refugee camp and the kidnapping of his editor, Terry Anderson.

Kay Zeidler McKay (1961) was instrumental in the



formation of the Big/Big Sisters of Flagstaff and served as president of Arizona Board of Regents. She was named Flagstaff's "Business Woman of the Year" and "Citizen of the Year." She was also a founding member of the Coconino Literacy Volunteers. Because of all her civic and educational

contributions to her community, she was awarded an honorary doctorate by Northern Arizona University and

NAU student housing was named McKay Village in her honor

Cliff Myrick (CHS baseball coach) was Catalina's first baseball coach as well as coaching softball and



volleyball at Catalina for 27 years. Outside his teaching duties, Myrick officiated at high school basketball and football games in Arizona for 50 years. He was selected as a member of the Arizona High School Coaches and Pima County Sports Halls of Fame.

Linda Ronstadt (1964) is the quintessential singer of

rock, Latino, standards, pop, jazz, opera, and country music. Her first gig was with the Stone Poneys. She was voted Top Female Pop Singer of the 1970s. Linda was honored with the National Medal of Arts. Her "Canciones de Mi Padre" was a tribute to her Hispanic heritage in Tucson. She was



honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Recording Arts and Sciences and was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 2014.

Rex Scott (CMHS principal) was principal from 2009-2014. He taught at many Tucson schools, was a principal, junior high vice-principal, and principal at



Howenstine High School. He said, "Education is the most rewarding profession you can work in; you can help student advance their hopes, their dreams, and their goals." During AIMS testing, he sought funds from the CHS Foundation to purchase healthy snacks so students could do their

best on the day of testing.

Tony Terry (1971) has brought laughter to Tucson residents and visitors for over 35 years with his melodramas at Gaslight Theater where the audience can

boo and hiss the villains and cheer the heroes. He started his company in Alaska calling it the "Might Moose Melodrama Theatre" but the group returned to Tucson where it was warm. As his audiences grew, he relocated to larger theaters. After the 9/11 terror attacks, the actors started



greeting the audience at the door to thank them for coming and reassure them that they were in a place where they could escape the outside world.

FOUNDATION CELEBRATES TENTH YEAR

The Catalina High School Foundation was created during the 50th celebration of Catalina's opening in January 2007 by alumni who graduated in 1957 to 1960.



They felt that Catalina needed to assist the teachers and students at the school. The CHSF Founders obtained non-profit status and donations began to roll in from all parts of the country as well as a few foreign countries. Mini-grants and scholarships were established and the Foundation began to offer

students and teachers the supplies and opportunities they did not have before. Currently, about \$3,000 to \$4,000 is given in the form of mini-grants per semester and they also award four scholarships per year.

To celebrate ten years of dedication to the teachers and students, the Foundation is having a barbecue to celebrate its success and to raise additional funds to continue that success.

Life Member Bill Neubauer, M.D. '61 has graciously offered his ranch for the site of the shindig.

Hundreds of photos were taken of the occasion. **Mary Canty** of TUSD Community Relations was there to record the day and her photos were posted on the TUSD Facebook page.

Upon completion of the ceremony, the band members were surprised by the CHS Foundation with donuts and orange juice. Even the teachers partook of two anniversary cakes after school to celebrate the occasion.
