PAUL GRAY SELECTED ALUM OF THE YEAR By Emily Kittle Morrison '60

Our 2014 Alum of the year, **Paul Gray**, is a member of the Class of 1960. He received a B.A., M.A., and PhD. from the U of A in electrical engineering. After graduation he worked for the R&D Lab at Fairchild Semiconductor in Palo Alto, Calif., and was involved in the application of new technologies for analog integrated circuits.

By 1971 he was asked to join the faculty of UC-Berkeley where he served as a professor in the Department of Engineering and Computer Sciences



and in the Graduate School. Paul has authored over 150 journal articles, made many conference presentations, has published four books, and is the author or co-author of 14 patents.

Paul Gray & Emily Morrison Paul is a member of the National Academy of Electrical Engineering, and he has received many honors and awards, including the National Outstanding Researcher Award from the Semi-conductor Industry Association.

Before retiring in 2006, Paul served both as Vice Chancellor and Provost for UC-Berkley, and most recently, he has served as Director of The Betty & Gordon Moore Foundation. It was through this connection that he was able to facilitate a generous donation to our CHSF scholarship fund which allowed for the funding of an additional scholarship for a Catalina student in the spring of 2014.

Paul holds honorary doctorates from the University of Bucharest in Romania, and the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology in Lausanne, Switzerland. "Dr. Gray has not only educated students nationwide about analog integrated circuits, but has been influential in the industry with his involvement of new technologies." He has served as a member of the National Academy of Engineering, the National Research Council Governing Board, and several corporate boards.

STAGGERING STUDENT STATISTICS

Catalina is not the school you knew when you were a student. Statistics have just been revealed about the current student population at Catalina.

The numbers show that there are 68 Youth on their Own students. YOTO is an organization which helps those who are living on their own by rendering assistance with rent, food, and other necessities. These students must attend school and maintain good grades.

There are 83 McKinney-Vento students who are defined as homeless by federal standards. They "lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence."

Finally, 81 percent of Catalina students are on food assistance. In other words, they receive free lunches at school. For some, this is their only meal of the day.

As disturbing as these numbers are, there are people at Catalina who are tasked with supporting these youth. They engage these students so that their time in class is productive and their needs are met.

SUSAN CURTIS RESIGNS, RETIRES

For the last eight years, the CHS Foundation has depended on **Susan Curtis**, Catalina's Dropout Prevention Specialist, to alert the Foundation to the needs of all the refugee, homeless, and immigrant students attending Catalina.

She spoke to organizations making them aware of the plight of these students. Many of these organizations offered food (100 chickens at Christmas), clothing, school supplies, money, and even a refrigerator/freezer. She took food boxes to students' families who had a bare larder. She went into homes teaching refugee families how to use the fixtures in the bathroom and kitchen. She organized graduation parties for the students who couldn't afford to attend the school's after-graduation party. She gathered graduation gowns on loan to students who couldn't afford to buy them so they could walk with their classmates. She asked for tassels for their caps which they could keep. always listened to her students, really listened to them. For many students, she was "Mother."

Last August Susan arrived to organize her office for the year's influx of students. She went to her computer to send emails and was surprised to find this message: "Access denied; contact your supervisor." She called her supervisor and was told she had been released. No explanation, just released.

Despite the efforts of the CHSF board and the new principal, TUSD could not get a grant to pay her. With sad hearts, board members said good-by to Susan wishing her well in retirement. In her honor, the board voted unanimously to rename the fund account allotted for needy students as the Curtis Fund.

FOUNDATION INDUCTS FIVE ALUMNI

The CHS Foundation All-Alumni Social theme was "Spotlight on Our Stars" and the scene of the 2014 Trojan Hall of Fame induction. Four stellar individuals were chosen by a ten-person committee to be honored.

Ford Burkhart, Ph.D. (1959) is a Pulitzer Prize



winning editor for The New York Times; had three Fulbright Fellowships to teach in Uganda, Malaysia, and Nigeria; is a retired UA professor of journalism; was head of the journalism department at the American University in Cairo, Egypt; and also has worked

for the Los Angeles Times, the Miami Herald, and The Associated Press.

Paula Fan, DMA (1969) is a UA Regent's Professor,

is principal pianist of the Tucson Symphony Orchestra, was a soloist on five continents; has performed with the Beijing Symphony, has recorded over nineteen albums; coordinates musical events Biosphere 2; debuted in London in 1977 and New York in 1978;



coaches opera singers from the world's greatest opera houses; and has broadcast on BBC, NPR, Radio/TV China, and other international stations.

Mary Hines was a Catalina coach from 1955 to 1985. She coached girls' volleyball before it officially became



an interscholastic girls' sport; her team took the Arizona State volleyball championships in 1968, 1972, and again in 1984; many of her students became coaches; in 1985 she was named the National High School Athletics Coaches Association "Coach of the Year;" and as

a tribute to her, the new Catalina gym was named in her honor in 1997.

Howard Post (1966) was the 1965 Arizona High School All-Around Rodeo Champion. premier award-winning Western artist whose paintings hang in many private collections, art museums, and corporate headquarters. His oils and pastels have appeared in a variety of exhibitions and have won many awards and honors. Recently he published a book of his various paintings entitled Howard Post:



He is now a

Western Perspectives. His work hangs locally in the Tucson Museum of Art. Still a cowboy at heart, he competes in amateur, senior, and pro rodeo events.

Paul Gray, Ph.D. (1960) is the Alum of the Year. The yearly winner for this prestigious award is selected

by the CHS Foundation Board of Directors. Every Alum of the Year is automatically an inductee to the Trojan Hall of Fame. (A full story about Paul Gray can be found on page 1.)

NEW PRINCIPAL INTRODUCES HERSELF By Ms. Kathryn Shaw, CHS Principal

My name is Kathi Shaw, and I'm the new principal at Catalina High School beginning this school year 2014-2015. I have worked in TUSD for 25 years this



December. I began as an elementary teacher, moved to teach middle school, and then onto high school as an Instructional Coach. My most recent position before Catalina was as the Assistant Principal for Teaching and Learning at Pueblo High School.

In April of 2014, Mr. Rex Scott, who I've known for several years and who I have tremendous respect for, called me after he knew the board was not going to renew his contract. He asked me to apply for the principal position, his words being, "If I have to leave, I can go with a better peace of mind if I know you are in charge." I can't thank Mr. Scott enough for making that phone call to me.

I fell in love with Catalina and its wonderful diversity, its tremendous extended community of supporters, and all the faculty and staff who give so much of themselves every day to support our children.

Catalina is part of a six school cohort working with the University of Virginia Darden School of Business. Their emphasis is on building strong leadership throughout the school and putting structures and systems into place that focus on using data to drive all decision making to improve student achievement. We are still in the learning phase of what being part of the UVA involves and I will share more with you later.

After talking with many stakeholders about what they wanted to see for the school year, almost to a person they said, we need a more academic environment. As an administrative team, with Mr. Holley and Mr. Madrid as my two incredible assistant principals, we eliminated hats inside the school, and cell phone use in the building except before school, in the cafeteria at lunch, and after school.

We set up guidelines as to where students could be and not be during the school day. We color coded bathrooms to discourage students from going wandering around campus. We are working vigilantly to find and prosecute drug users, and the message is spreading that you can't get away with this on Catalina's campus any more. We are sending the message that school is about academics.

Students always rise to expectations and it has been no different this year. Feedback from parents, students, faculty, and staff has been extremely positive. It is hard to follow in the footsteps of someone as loved as Mr. Scott, but as we finish this first semester, I know that Catalina High School is in a great place moving forward with so many exciting things to come.

ADVISORY BOARD ESTABLISHED

The purpose of the Advisory Board is to provide guidance to the Catalina High School Foundation Board in fulfilling the mission and goals of the Foundation, and to provide advice and expertise on issues, projects, and programs. These individuals will be available to assist the Board to fulfill its mission: To enhance the educational opportunities and cultural activities of the Catalina High School community.

FOUNDATION GIVEN PERMISSION TO PROCEED WITH CONFERENCE ROOM

It was a dream of the CHS Foundation to have a room where they could hold their meetings, some events, and give the school access to a venue for other activities. This dream has materialized due to the support and blessing of the Catalina administration.

Principal **Kathie Shaw** and Vice Principal **Taz Holley** worked to convince TUSD that this would be beneficial to the school to have such a room available.

Besides using the room for their monthly meetings, the Foundation would make the room available to teachers, counselors, students, and other school groups on a first come, first served basis.

Escorted by their teacher **Jack Draper**, these construction trades students experienced the Habitat for Humanity concept of building homes for needy families through volunteering. They were so inspired by what they learned, each student said they wanted to volunteer in the future as well. Their skills would make them

uniquely qualified.



For an hour, each student rode a stationary bike. Then they ate pizza, and were presented with a El Tour t-shirt and medallion which they wore proudly in their

group photo.

The students experienced the gift of giving of their time and understanding the investment that others make

in them. They are now able to be ambassadors for other families needing housing or rehab on their own homes, and learned about



future volunteer opportunities. They were an important part of the over \$16,500 raised in the *Ride for Home* which directly benefitted Habitat for Humanity in Tucson.
