Feeder School Students Attend Amazing CHS Block Party

Over the summer of 2022, members of the AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) site teams for 4 schools met and hatched the idea of having a big multi-school event at Catalina High School that would include three of Catalina's feeder schools. The idea behind the event was to strengthen the relationships between the schools, and promote the retention of students from elementary through high school. As educators, we are aware that student retention is a big issue,

and we want our communities to continue choosing to send their students to our public schools.

AVID is a program that teaches students essential skills for college and career readiness. It targets students who are not exceptional and gives those students new tools, and teaches strong habits and skills that make students critical thinkers and confident, well-rounded people. AVID classes introduce students to college and university culture; they provide mentors from the university; and provide several field trips to make those AVID students feel that higher education is possible for them.

Our April 26th block party was a HUGE SUCCESS. We were able to coordinate the four schools and provide many activities, performances, and community support. We had great attendance from all schools and had appropriate activities for all grade levels. Students were especially excited to dunk their teachers in the dunk tank. I loved the student art display that was in the gym lobby. The face painting and balloon animals were especially popular with our younger students; in fact, the next day at school there were a few unicorns and butterflies still clinging to smiling faces.

Our goal was to build community: to make the Catalina feeder school students feel that they have

a natural and logical progression as they move through their grade levels; to have Catalina High School welcome it's feeder schools with a party where there is something for everyone; and where families get to see the school and imagine their future there. I think we did that for our kids in attendance. I can only hope that this event grows as the years go by.

The CHS Foundation's support of this event was much appreciated, as was expressed to those of you who were in attendance. Thank you for taking a chance on this first annual event. We hope that next year we can put it on again.

Mark Bahti

Mark graduated from Catalina in 1968 and studied at both Prescott College and the University of Arizona. However, before finishing any degrees, his father passed



away after starting Bahti Indian Arts. At the young age of 22, Mark took over the business and has been running it ever since, expanding the business to two Tucson shops and one in Santa Fe. Since then Mark has finished a BA in Anthropology and a Masters in American Indian Studies at the UofA.

Mark has written several books about Native American arts including "Navajo Sandpainting Art", and is currently working on a history of Southwest Indian jewelry. He also is a long -time member of the alumni interested in joining such a foundation. In addition, he has made sure we build a "strong foundation" by serving as our capable Treasurer for all these years. Although Terry had to work during his high school years, he was an active member of the Catalina A Capella Choir, the Double Mixed Quartet, the Catalina

Swing Band; and was a member of the famed Tucson Boys Chorus.

Terry has also served as a key member of the class of '57 and made sure they kept in touch both throughout the year with frequent lunches, and served as co-chair of their 50th reunion. Terry graduated from the University of Arizona with a BA and a certificate as a specialist as an elementary teacher, and taught for three years at Harrelson Elementary School. He attended ASU for his master's degree in counseling, and then had a long career (32 years) as a middle school counselor in San Mateo, California. Because of his love of



helping students, he has always served on our scholarship committee and has helped numerous CHS students attend and succeed at both Pima Community College and the University of Arizona. For these reasons and more, Terry Anderson is named the Alum of the Year for 2023.

Tucson Indian Art Center and was a chair of the Institute of American Indian Arts Foundation in Santa Fe. He continues to do research in Southwest Native Arts, living in Tucson, but spending summers in Santa Fe.

Mary Jacobs

Growing up in Tucson, Mary graduated from Catalina in 1981 and followed that with a BA in Political Science and a Master of



Public Administration from the UofA. She used the knowledge in a variety of public positions, most recently being the Town Manager for Oro Valley from 2017-2022. Prior to this position, Mary was the Assistant City Manager for Sierra Vista, and also held positions in Massachusetts and Maricopa County, Arizona. From 2011-2014, she was appointed by the US Secretaries of Interior and Agriculture to serve on the Wildland Fire Executive Council and as a representative to the National League of Cities. She has volunteered at the Cochise County Juvenile Detention Center providing mentorship to young women and as a Court Appointed Special Advocate for the Arizona Supreme Court working with children in the foster care system. Mary is a model for other women in public service.

Peter Kozachik

Pete enjoyed photography and art classes at Catalina and graduated in 1969. Even as a child, he watched movies with a special



eye for lighting, composition, and special effects. After studying graphic arts and physics at the UofA, Pete went on to an exciting career as a visual effects artist and a cinematographer. He is a proud member of the American Society of Cinematographers. Pete was the director of photography on the features James and the Giant Peach and the Nightmare before Christmas. On the latter, Kozachik was part of the movie's visual effects team which was nominated for an Academy Award for Best Effects in 1994. Pete has worked as a Cinematographer and directing Special effects for well known films such as Starship: The Voyage Home and two Matrix films. He has recently written a book: Tales from the Pumpkin King's Cameraman which is an entertaining memoir.



Kathy Krucker

Kathy is a fifth generation Tucsonan and was an outstanding athlete and student at Catalina High School, graduating in 1967. She played

tennis and vollevball at Catalina and went on to the University of Arizona where she was the Volleyball Team Captain with State Championships in '70 and '71. She was also an outstanding swimmer for the UofA and named Outstanding Sportswoman in 1971. After graduation, Kathy became an amazing high school biology teacher, influencing thousands of students with her science expertise and leadership skills. She was the Christa McAuliff Fellowship winner for Arizona in 1995. She was also Arizona Science Teacher of the Year in 2001. She volunteered as a Patient Instructor for the University of Arizona College of Medicine for 13 years. After retirement, she supervised student teachers for the University of Arizona. Kathy is also an outstanding underwater

photographer with work shown on the TMC Healing Arts website as well as her beautiful website, AZScubacat.com.

John Snavely

John graduated from Catalina in 1968 and was an outstanding musician even in high school. He performed at Carnegie hall with the American



Youth Performs Orchestra. He went on to the University of Arizona where he studied music, and obtained a Doctorate in Music and is still affectionately known as "Dr. John". While in college he won an audition to play clarinet and bass clarinet in the Tucson Symphony Orchestra and continued to play with that group for many years. He was director of their Young Composer Project for seven years. John shared his musical expertise with many students, teaching at Pima College, the University of Arizona, and Black Hills State College. John assisted in founding Opening Minds Through the Arts for the Tucson Unified School District and co-authored a major grant from the US Department of Education to fund the project. This project has provided opportunities to thousands of students to learn more about the arts.

Forrest Metz

Forrest Metz graduated from Catalina in 1964 and excelled in math and science. He went on to earn a Bachelor of Science in

Engineering from the University, using that degree to be a successful civil engineer and planner. In 1974, he founded his own firm, Urban Engineering, which still exists today, known for civil engineering, planning, and surveying. He also built many other businesses including Celutel, a pioneer in cellular telecommunications, as well as several other real estate development and telecommunications businesses. Forrest served on many community projects and boards including Arizona School Facilities Board, **Educational Enrichment** Foundation, Boys and Girls Club of Tucson, United Way of Greater Tucson, Southwestern Fair Commission, Tucson Airport Authority, and University of Arizona Foundation President's Club. Forrest died in 2016, leaving a large legacy in Tucson and Southern Arizona.

Mini-Grants Build a Strong Foundation

CHSF mini-grants provided teacher appreciation events, and special opportunities for students, helping to facilitate an 85% retention rate for the faculty.

Cheryl Cargill, \$150 to pay for bus transportation for 30 Exceptional Education students to attend a hands-on experience and visit to the Mini-Time Museum.

Megan McConaughy, \$500 to help subsidize catering for a senior dinner for about 100 seniors. Our funds paid for approximately 40 seniors.

Foundation Welcomes Trojan Teachers


